

TAP CITY 2004, the New York City Tap Festival

Tap City 2004 started off with a bang on Saturday, July 3rd at Chelsea Studios with master classes and continued throughout the week with classes, courses, jam sessions,

tap discussions and film screenings until Saturday, July 10th. Our Adult Program Director Margaret Morrison and our Youth Program Director Michele Ribble, coordinated and created programming that offered a variety of levels, styles and techniques that were taught in 138 classes by 38 different instructors. A total of 383 students participated from 29 states and 19 countries.

On Monday, July 5th, 350 hoofers, tappers and watchers joined us for our first annual Jazz Boat Ride and Tap Jam in the tradition of the legendary Copasetics. New York's famous Circle Line Tours took Tap City on a Jazz Dinner Cruise around Manhattan for four hours of dancing, singing, laughter and Lasagna. Students, teachers, performers and the festival staff brought their shoes and jammed on the water with a live Jazz trio while watching

the sun go down. Special guests included Captain Harold Cromer, Ernest "Brownie" Brown, Mable Lee, Yvette Glover and Brenda Bufalino. This event was such a smash hit, that we plan on repeating it next year!

This was our fourth year at the Duke on 42nd Street Theater and our opening night benefit performance and reception was a huge success thanks to a dedicated Gala Committee. The evening began in the theater with performances by Brenda Bufalino, the Jazz Tap Ensemble (Charon Aldredge, Joseph and Josette Wiggan, Channing Cook Holmes, and Lynn Dally), Kendrick Jones II, The Legacy Dancers, Erika Bauerlein, Byron Tittle, Michela Marino Lerman, Van "the Man" Porter, Dr. Jimmy Slyde, and Broadway sensation Lillias White, beautifully accompanied by Larry Ham on piano, Earl May on bass, Bernice Brooks on drums and Dan Block on Reeds. The evening included tributes to the late tap Ambassador Gregory Hines and MGM's tap dance royalty the late Donald O'Connor and Ann Miller. All three were inducted into the International Tap Dance Hall of Fame. Board member Constance Valis Hill also announced from stage the launching of the Gregory Hines

Collection of American Tap Dance, which is a collaborative archival project with the Dance Division at The New York Public Library of the Performing Arts. The second half of the show continued upstairs at the Tap Lounge and featured Roxane Butterfly, Max Pollak, Chikako Iwahori, Nicholas Young, Tapage and numeroius musicians from New York's hottest world beat scene. The Tap Lounge was curated by Max Pollak and all the proceeds went to support future programming of the American Tap Dance Foundation.

On Wednesday, July 7th, we presented Tap Internationals with performances by local Flamenco Latino, Grant Swift (Australia/New Zealand), Flavia Costa (Brazil), Raw Metal Dance Company (Australia), Steven Harper Company (Brazil), Tapage (France/Japan), Kazu Kumagai (Japan), Andreas Dänel (Germany) and Ritmico (Brazil & beyond). As usual, this show was the sleeper event! We owe a great deal of thanks to the international community for infusing new and renewed energy into the tap community.

As always, we presented Tap Youth, Tap Future, our annual youth program performance with 69 kids, teens and youth ensembles from across the nation. Hosted by Tap City 's Youth Program Director Michele Ribble, the evening also included the presentation of the 2nd annual Tap Teacher Awards which were presented to Kathleen Cirioli and Yvonne Edwards. The level of performance just gets better and better! Our youth is our future and a special congratulations goes to Ms. Ribble!

On Friday night, July 9th, we presented two shows of Tap New York witch featured local masters, soloists, and ensembles including Brenda Bufalino, Barbara Duffy & Company, Dormeshia Sumbry Edwards, Charles Goddertz, Mable Lee, Reggio "the hoofer" McLaughlin, Margaret Morrison, Michele Ribble, Germaine Salsberg, Baakari Wilder and others. Ensemble pieces created during the festival by Karen Callaway Williams and Tony Waag were also premiered, and the annual Tap Preservation Award was presented to Jane Goldberg for outstanding achievement in the preservation of tap dance.

The festival culminated with two performances of Tap Masters/Tap Treasures

on Saturday, July 10th. Performers included Chloe Arnold, Terry Brock, Brenda Bufalino, Harold Cromer, Lynn Dally, Generation Tap, Josh Hilberman, Pamela Raff, the Rhythm Queens (Germaine Goodson and Deborah Mitchell), Shoehorn, Jason Samuels Smith, and numerous tributes to legendary masters and teachers Charles "Honi" Coles, the Copasetics, Paul Draper, Henry LeTang, Bettye Morrow and Leonard Reed . The annual Hoofer Awards were presented to tap masters, Ernest "Brownie" Brown, Dianne Walker and LaVaughn Robinson. (LaVaughn was represented by dance partner Germaine Ingram in his absence).

Each day, a series of Tap Talks/Tap Films were presented and offered free to registered students. These noon time events were hosted by various artists including Brenda Bufalino, Laraine Goodman, Constance Valis-Hill, Michela Marino Lerman and Margaret Morrison.

Finally, ATDF gave away 43 youth training scholarships this year! This I am VERY proud of, and all of this programming and all of this giving is due to the consistency and very generous support of our corporate, foundation and government sponsors, our individual donors, our friends and families, the students, volunteers, advocates and audiences. And special thanks also goes out to our anonymous angel, my administrative staff, the ATDF Board of Directors, our Gala committee, our Advisory Committee, our

newly formed Leadership Committee, our work exchange students, and all the incredible artists, musicians and teachers! A very big thanks is due to all involved! We've finished our fourth year, and each year the festival gets better and better. I just wish I could personally attend all the events! I guess part of being a producer is delegating projects and trusting that the events will go smoothly! Fortunately, I feel very supported, and I have great help. I continue to realize that it's the community that creates the event. It's the dancers and musicians performing the material that is in their heart. It's the staff and the technicians that are doing the job or creating the position that they want to be in, that brings a group of people together with a spark and ignites an event! It's the reaction from the students and the audiences that move us forward. My goal is to have the city itself, the press, the local community, more involved. New York City could benefit from a positive spirit and commitment that continues to inspire a growing population!

NEW ON THE HORIZON!

I am thrilled to announce that next year we move our performances during the festival to the famed Joyce Theater, New York's premiere dance venue! We are all looking forward to a larger space. This not only allows us to expand our audiences, but allows us to share the energy that Tap City has created since 2001. This year we are challenged by additional programming that includes our annual Winter Tap Intensive in February, Tap City on Tour which goes to 15 different theaters across the country and our ongoing upgrading and development of year-round events like new choreography showcases, occasional fundraising parties, etc. All of this programming needs additional administrative support and staff, increased financial support, and new business/creative advisors with fresh ideas.

Excerpt from Tapping the Source

By ATDF's Artistic Director Brenda Bufalino

"In 1955 when I began studying with Honi tap was already on its way out as a popular art-dance. Though he considered himself an impresario of sorts and wanted

to help me navigate my career, it was always my Afro-Cuban act that got the work. Tap Dance now was relegated to the Monday night Iam Sessions with out- of- work dancers at "Dance Craft." This was perhaps the climax of my early tap education, improvising, trading four and eight bars with some of the greatest dancers I had ever seen or heard. At these sessions someone was always playing the piano, humming or singing. In my

eleven young years of studying and performing I never had the occasion to dance to canned taped music or records. Now a student of dance is fortunate to ever be accompanied by live music. They strain to find where a bar begins and ends on a CD. Music is often just background to out-of-time rattling. The understanding of musical structure, the most essential component in the development of a tap dancer, if it comes at all, usually has to be learned on-the-hoof.

I now have over fifty years of performing, creating choreography and teaching dancers all over the world. Though I studied and performed many other forms of dance after the venues for tap dance closed down, gradually the intoxicating rhythms of America's own indigenous art form found there way back into my performance lexicon. After including tap dance in my mixed-media, and avantgarde performances in the 1960's and early 70's, the enthusiastic reception made me feel that the audience was ready for its return and I decided to give my full attention to percussive dance. At that time to

specialize in this form seemed an unlikely, even foolhardy choice as there were so few places to perform tap dance. But students

every class I offered,


and as I discovered ways of teaching this very complex form of Rhythm Tap I became more aware of what I did not know. What I performed and knew intuitively, I had never scrutinized with conscious appraisal because the Masters of Rhythm tap had relieved me of the responsibility understanding what I was doing by convincing me of my talent and innate ability to "swing."

In 1973 anticipating and helping to initiate the revival

of tap dance, I began to present my early mentor and dear friend Honi Coles, and members of The Copasetic Club to the audiences in New Paltz, New York where I was teaching at the college and at my own studio and performance space..."The Dancing Theatre." It was there in 1975 that I produced and directed them in a two hour documentary "Great Feats of Feet... Portrait of the Jazz Tap Dancer," featuring Honi Coles, Charles Cook, Bubba Gaines, Ernest Brown, Buster Brown, Albert Gibson, and James Stump Cross. During that intense week of video taping these masters I was transfixed, and re-inspired by the depth and complexity of this art form and overwhelmed by how much I had yet to learn about rhythm tap and its presentation. I decided to dedicate my life in dance, choreography, teaching and performance ... to the development, preservation, presentation and performance of tap dance."
